

**A 100g (3.5 oz) portion contains:** Vit A: 26%, Vit C: 35%, Magnesium: 17%, Manganese: 15%, Potassium: 14%, Iron: 11%, Calcium: 7%.

High Nutritional Value: It is an excellent source of Vitamin C (historically used to treat scurvy), Vitamin A (for eye health).

Heart Health: > Omega-3 fatty acids - lower "bad" (LDL) cholesterol and triglycerides while reducing blood pressure.

Skin Health & Immunity: High Vit A content helps with skin rejuvenation; high Vit C supports immune system health.


**Precaution: only downside is it has oxalates which can cause the formation of kidney stones.**




# Introduction

## 1. The Call to True Worship and Ethical Living

A central theme in Micah is that God is not satisfied with outward religious forms, sacrifices, or rituals, particularly when they are separated from daily life and moral conduct.

**Micah 6:8** is frequently highlighted as the summary of the whole book: "*He has shown you, O man, what is good; And what does the LORD require of you But to do justly, and to love mercy, And to walk humbly with your God?*".

**Justice and Mercy:** True religion requires actively doing justice and practicing kindness to others, especially the poor and marginalized.





## **2. Social Injustice and Corruption**

Micah condemned the wealthy and powerful for exploiting the poor, stealing land, and violating the covenant (Torah) laws.

He exposed corrupt leaders, including civil rulers who took bribes and religious leaders (priests and prophets) who taught for money.

The sins of the cities (Samaria and Jerusalem) were highlighted as leading to the downfall of the nation.





## **3. The Remnant and Restoration**

Despite the severe warnings of judgment, the book provides a message of hope, focusing on the "remnant" of God's people.

God promises to gather the faithful remnant, similar to a shepherd gathering a flock.

This remnant will be restored to their land, and God will demonstrate his mercy by forgiving their iniquities and passing over the transgressions of his heritage.



# Introduction

## 4. Divine Judgment and the Coming Messiah

Micah warned of coming destruction upon Israel and Judah, to be carried out by Assyria and Babylon.

Messianic Prophecy ([Micah 5:2](#)): Micah explicitly predicts that the promised Ruler (Messiah) would come from the humble town of Bethlehem.

This Shepherd-King will rule in righteousness and usher in a time of peace, often interpreted in a millennial context ([Micah 4:3-4](#)).



*But you, Bethlehem, though you are little among the thousands of Judah, yet out of you shall come forth to Me the One to be Ruler in Israel, whose goings forth are from of old, from everlasting.*

# Introduction

## 5. Eschatological Application

The dire warnings and promises of restoration in Micah have "last-day" overtones.

**The Final Remnant**: The mention of the remnant ([Micah 2:12; 4:7](#)) is applied to the final end-time remnant ([Rev 12:17](#)).


**"In the Last Days"**: The prophecy in [Micah 4:1-5](#) regarding the mountain of the Lord being established is seen as an eschatological promise of God's final kingdom.



# **Introduction**

## **6. The Character of God ("Who is Like God?")**

The name Micah means "Who is like Yahweh?". The book concludes with a powerful declaration of God's mercy and his delight in steadfast love (7:18-20). God is presented as a forgiving, compassionate God who will not retain his anger forever.

## 7. The Role and Suffering of the Prophet

Micah's own life and ministry reflect the pain of delivering unpopular messages.

He shares the "agony" of needing to call for repentance in a time of deep apostasy, yet finds hope in God's ultimate triumph.



# **1 - Jesus in the book of Micah**

## **1. The Sovereign Judge Coming Down**

Micah 1:3-4 describes the Lord coming out of His place to "tread on the high places of the earth," causing mountains to melt and valleys to split. **1 Thessalonians 4:16-17**

## 2. *The Witness Against Sin*


Jesus is the "Lord from His holy temple" who bears witness against injustice, idolatry, and empty rituals ([Micah 1:2](#)). He is holy and cannot tolerate the sins of the people. [John 7:7](#)



# 1 - *Jesus in the book of Micah*

## 3. *The Shepherd-King*

**Micah 2:12:** The chapter concludes with a promise to "surely assemble" the remnant of Israel, gathering them like sheep in a fold. This imagery directly points to Jesus as the Good Shepherd who gathers His people, a theme that is developed further in **John 10:11**.

## 4. "The Breaker" Who Opens the Way

Micah 2:13 describes "The One who breaks open the way" who goes up before the people, breaks through the gates, and leads them out of captivity. The resurrection of Christ, by which He broke out of the grave and opened the way for His followers. 1 Corinthians 15:20-23



# 1 - Jesus in the book of Micah

## 5. The Destruction of the Jerusalem

**Micah 3:12** "Therefore, shall Zion for your sake be ploughed as a field, and Jerusalem shall become heaps..."

This prophecy of the Temple's destruction finds its ultimate meaning in Christ, who predicted the destruction of the Temple (**Matthew 24:1-2**)



# 1 - *Jesus in the book of Micah*

## 6. *The King of Peace*

**Micah 4:1-4** The passage predicts that in the last days, the mountain of the Lord's house will be exalted, and nations will stream to it, seeking God's ways. Jesus is the ultimate fulfilment of this, bringing peace between God and humanity. **Colossians 1:20**




# 1 - Jesus in the book of Micah

## 7. The Gatherer of the Flock

**Micah 4:6-7** The Lord promises to "assemble the lame" and "gather the outcasts".

Jesus explicitly identifies himself as the Good Shepherd who gathers the lost sheep of Israel, heals the broken-hearted, and welcomes the outcasts.

**John 10:11, 14, 16**




# 1 - Jesus in the book of Micah

## 8. The Deliverer from Exile

**Micah 4:10** The promise that the Lord "will deliver you" from Babylon refers to a physical return, but also acts as a picture of spiritual redemption.

Jesus is the ultimate Deliverer who rescues humanity from the captivity of sin and death. **Romans 7:24-25**



# 1 - Jesus in the book of Micah

## 9. The Birthplace and Divinity

**Micah 5:2** "But thou, Bethlehem Ephratah... out of thee shall he come forth unto me that is to be ruler in Israel; whose goings forth have been from of old, from everlasting."

**Matthew 2:1-6**, explicitly names Bethlehem as the birthplace of the Messiah. The phrase "from everlasting" indicates His pre-existence as the Son of God, not just a human king.



# 1 - Jesus in the book of Micah

## 10. The Fulfilment of Divine Requirements

**Micah 6:8** The requirement to act justly, love mercy, and walk humbly is a reflection of Christ's life. Jesus fulfilled divine justice on the cross, showed ultimate mercy to sinners, and walked in perfect humility.

**Romans 3:25-26**

## THE HUMILITY OF JESUS CHRIST

Philippians 2:5 Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus: 6 Who, being in the form of God, thought it not robbery to be equal with God: 7 But made himself of no reputation, and took upon him the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness of men: 8 And being found in fashion as a man, he humbled himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross.




# 1 - Jesus in the book of Micah

## 11. The Ultimate Redeemptor

**Micah 6:4** God reminds Israel of his redemption from Egypt ("I... redeemed thee out of the house of servants"). This physical redemption points toward the spiritual redemption from sin accomplished by Jesus.

**Matthew 9:6**



**“He made Him who knew no sin to be sin for us, that we might become the righteousness of God in Him.” 2 Corinthians 5:21**



# 1 - Jesus in the book of Micah

## 12. The Advocate and Justifier

**Micah 7:8** The speaker trusts God to "...plead my cause, and execute judgment for me: he will bring me forth to the light, and I shall behold his righteousness."

This points to Jesus as our advocate and the source of imputed righteousness. **1 John 2:1**


## 2 - Remnant in the book of Micah c2

1. The Remnant is Defined by Separation and Uprightness (vv. 10, 7)
2. God Promises to Actively Assemble the Remnant (v. 12)
3. The Remnant Will Be Protected and Nurtured (v. 12)
4. The Remnant is Led by "The Breaker" (a Messianic title referring to Jesus Christ) (v. 13)



## 2 - Remnant in the book of Micah c3

1. The Call to Moral Integrity Over Self-Serving Leadership (vv. 1–3)
2. The Danger of False Security and "Religious" Hypocrisy (v. 11)
3. The Consequence of Rejecting God's Justice (v. 4)
4. The Power of the Spirit-Filled Messenger (v. 8)
5. The Inevitability of Judgment for Injustice (v. 12)

1. The Power of Transformation (From Lame to Strong) (v. 7)

# 3 - Lessons from the Book of Micah

## The Mandate for Social Justice:

**Micah 6:8** ("do justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with your God") is a core message, highlighting that the remnant must not only have correct doctrine but must also act justly, showing compassion to the poor and weak.

**Correction of Hypocrisy:** The remnant is called to avoid the sins of ancient Israel, which included religious hypocrisy—performing rituals while exploiting the vulnerable.



# 3 - Lessons from the Book of Micah

## Trust in God Amidst Spiritual

Corruption: In a time where "the faithful man has perished from the earth" ([Micah 7:2](#)), the remnant is to look to the Lord, wait for the God of their salvation, and trust that He will hear them ([Micah 7:7](#)).

## The Promise of Restoration and

Preservation: [Micah 2:12-13](#) promises that God will assemble the "remnant of Israel" like sheep in a fold, even after periods of captivity. The remnant is reminded that God is a shepherd who gathers and protects His people.




# Conclusion


A "Remnant Who Halts" (Hope for the Weak): [Micah 4:7](#) promises that God will make her that "halted" (or limped) a remnant. This encourages the remnant that even those with spiritual struggles or weaknesses can be part of God's final, victorious group, as their place is secured by God's grace.

## God's Character as Judge and Savior:

The book emphasizes that God delights in mercy ([Micah 7:18](#)) and will cast all sins into the "depths of the sea" ([Micah 7:19](#)), providing assurance of salvation to the remnant.


