

Traditional Chinese Medicine: It used to treat sunstroke, reduce fever, relieve digestive issues caused by extreme heat


Weight Management: Being low in calories, it is an excellent snack for those looking to manage weight while staying full.





Introduction

1. "The Just Shall Live by Faith" (Habakkuk 2:4)

Faithfulness as Endurance:

The Hebrew word *emuna* (faith) refers to dependability, constancy, and faithfulness. This means living by faith is not just initial belief, but a steady, patient reliance on God, even when circumstances look grim.

Justification by Faith: This verse is a foundational text for the doctrine of justification by faith, emphasizing that the righteous are saved by trusting in God, not by their works.

Contrast with the Wicked: The proud (represented by Babylon) will fail, but the righteous will survive through their faith.




Introduction

2. *Trusting God's Sovereignty in Times of Perplexity*

Habakkuk questions God, asking "How long...?" and "Why...?" when faced with violence in Judah and the prospect of a cruel nation (Babylon) bringing judgment.

The Inscrutable Plan: The book teaches that God's methods are not always understandable, yet He is sovereign and holds all nations accountable.

Theodicy: The book serves as a defense of God's goodness and power (theodicy) in the face of evil.



Introduction

3. *Waiting Patiently for Divine Intervention*

A key theme is "waiting on the Lord"—a concept deeply relevant to the Seventh-day Adventist message of looking for the Second Coming.

The "Tarrying Time": Ellen G. White applies [Habakkuk 2:3](#) ("Though it tarry, wait for it") to the Millerite disappointment of 1844, highlighting that the vision of God's final intervention may seem to take long, but it will surely come.

The Judgment of Babylon: God promises that while He uses Babylon as a "rod of anger" to punish, Babylon itself will eventually be judged.



Introduction

4. Moving from Worry to Worship (*Habakkuk 3*)

The book acts as a model for the believer's prayer life.

Lament to Praise: The book moves from complaint (1:2-4) to a "paean of praise" (3:17-19).

Rejoicing in God Alone: Despite the loss of crops or economic disaster, Habakkuk resolves to "rejoice in the God of my salvation". True joy is independent of circumstances and found only in God.

Introduction

5. The End-Time Application

There is a strong parallel between Habakkuk's day and the final days of Earth's history.

The Remnant Church: The "righteous" are those who maintain faith, waiting patiently for the Second Coming, resembling the "patience of the saints" described in [Revelation 14:12](#).

The Final Judgment: The promise that "the earth will be filled with the knowledge of the glory of the Lord, as the waters cover the sea" ([Habakkuk 2:14](#)) points to the ultimate victory of God's kingdom.



1 - Jesus in the book of Habakkuk

1. The Sovereign Worker

In **Habakkuk 1:5**, God states, "I am going to do something in your days that you would not believe."

This refers to God's unexpected, overarching plan of redemption through Christ, which transcends immediate circumstances.

2. The Eternal Protector

Habakkuk 1:12

proclaims, "Lord, are you not from everlasting? My God, my Holy One, we will not die." This highlights Jesus as the eternal, holy Savior who preserves his people.



3. The Justifier of the Faithful

The foundation of living by faith in God's, rather than one's own, understanding is set in **Habakkuk 1**. This faith is in the ultimate, just action of God, fulfilled in Jesus. **Romans 3:26**



GOD IS JUST
God cannot ignore sin;
the full penalty for violations
of law must be paid

GOD IS JUSTIFIER
God justifies the guilty; He
acquits men of their sins and
declares them innocent

GOD IS JUST AND THE JUSTIFIER

God sent Jesus to pay the penalty for the guilty who could not ; it was the just for the unjust. This satisfies the demands of the law for punishment so God can be just and also be the justifier of all that believe in Jesus.



4. Justification by Faith (Habakkuk 2:4)

The core message, "the righteous shall live by his faith," is a foundation for the New Testament gospel (Romans 1:17, Galatians 3:11, Hebrews 10:38).

It highlights that believers are made right with God through faith in Jesus, not by their own works or righteousness.

5. The Glory of Christ (Habakkuk 2:14)

The prophecy that "the earth will be filled with the knowledge of the glory of the Lord, as the waters cover the sea" points to the ultimate establishment of Jesus' kingdom and the spreading of the gospel throughout the world.

6. Jesus as the Judge (*Habakkuk 2:5-20*)

The five "woes" pronounced against the arrogant and unjust Babylonians foreshadow Christ's final judgment on all evil, injustice, and idolatry. *Revelation 18*

7. The Sovereign Lord in His Temple (*Habakkuk 2:20*)

"The Lord is in his holy temple; let all the earth keep silence before him" points to Jesus as the Sovereign Lord, who is in control even when it seems otherwise. [John 2:19-21](#)



8. The Savior and Anointed One (Habakkuk 3:13)

The passage declares,
"You went forth for the
salvation of Your people,
for salvation with Your
Anointed".

This directly points to Jesus
Christ as the Messiah—
the ultimate agent of
deliverance. [John 8:36](#)



9. The Divine Warrior (Habakkuk 3:8-15)

The "chariot of salvation" (v. 8) and the warrior imagery depict God coming to conquer evil and save His people.

This foreshadows Jesus' conquering sin, death, and the enemy to bring salvation.

10. Mercy in the Midst of Wrath (Habakkuk 3:2)

Habakkuk prays, "in wrath remember mercy". Jesus is the personification of this plea, as He took the wrath of God for sin, ensuring believers receive mercy. 1 John 4:10

11. Joy in Times of Famine ([Habakkuk 3:17-18](#))

Despite the lack of crops or livestock, the prophet declares, "I will rejoice in the LORD, I will be joyful in God my Savior".

This highlights Jesus as the ultimate joy and, sufficient provider, even when earthly circumstances are barren. [John 15:11](#)



1 - Jesus in the book of Habakkuk

12. Source of Strength (**Habakkuk 3:19**)

"The Sovereign LORD is my strength; he makes my feet like the feet of a deer; he enables me to go on the heights".

This represents the spiritual strength found in Jesus, which allows believers to endure in difficult times. **John 16:33**



2 - Remnant in the book of Habakkuk

1. The Righteous Minority (Habakkuk 1:2-4).

While the nation as a whole is corrupt, the remnant consists of those who cry out against iniquity and violence. **2 Timothy 2:19**




2 - Remnant in the book of Habakkuk

2. "More Righteous" than the Oppressor (Hab. 1:13)

Despite their imperfections, this remnant is described as "more righteous" than the Babylonians (Chaldeans) who are sent to punish them.



3. Living by Faith (Hab. 1:12)

The remnant is defined by a deep-seated trust in God's character, which foreshadows the core message that "the just shall live by his faith".

Romans 1:17



4. "The Just Shall Live by Faith" (Hab. 2:4)

This is the core defining characteristic of the remnant. While the wicked are "lifted up" (proud, self-sufficient), the righteous remnant is defined by their unwavering trust in God, not their own actions.



2 - Remnant in the book of Habakkuk

5. Waiting in Patient Faith (Hab. 2:3)

The "vision" (deliverance) is for an "appointed time" at the "end". The remnant is described as those who, despite delays and trials, wait patiently for God's intervention, similar to the "patience of the saints" described in [Revelation 14:12](#).

6. Contrast to Babylon (Hab. 2:20)

The chapter outlines five "woes" against the proud and violent Babylonian power. The remnant is the opposite—a group that rejects the "idols" of human strength and, instead, remains silent and submissive before God, who is "in His holy temple". [Romans 11:4-5](#)

7. The Message for the Time of the End

The destruction of Babylon in Habakkuk as a type of the final judgment. The remnant is thus defined as the end-time people of God who, amid a world filled with violence ("hamas") and moral decay, live by the faith of Jesus, holding onto the promise of a world filled with the knowledge of God's glory.

2 - Remnant in the book of Habakkuk

8. The Context of Trial (Hab. 3:17)

Chapter 3 describes a scenario of complete loss—no figs, grapes, olives, or cattle—symbolizing a time of great economic or physical distress. The "remnant" are those who do not rely on these material blessings but on God alone. [Romans 11:5–6](#)





9. The Faith of the Remnant (Hab. 3:18)

Despite the devastation, the remnant resolves to "rejoice in the Lord" and take joy in the God of their salvation. This reflects the righteous living by faith. **Philippians 4:4**

The World doesn't need sermons; it needs a message.

"Return to Me," says the Lord!

10. The Strength of the Remnant (Hab. 3:19)

God is recognized as their strength, enabling them to "walk upon high hills" (or "tread on the heights"), which symbolises spiritual security, triumph, and victory in the face of despair. [2 Corinthians 4:8-9](#)



2 - Remnant in the book of Habakkuk

11. The Prayer for Revival (Hab. 3:2)

Habakkuk prays for God to "revive Your work in the midst of the years," which is interpreted as a plea for God to preserve His church and bring to life a, or the, remnant during a time of judgment.

The judgement is happening now and only a remnant will be saved [Romans 11:5](#).



3 - Lessons from the Book of Habakkuk

Living by Faith: The central message is that "the righteous shall live by his faith" ([Hab. 2:4](#)). This means trusting in God's character and promises, not just in visible circumstances.

Trusting God's Timing: While Habakkuk wanted immediate action against injustice, he learned to wait for God's perfect timing and judgment, knowing that evil will not go unpunished.



3 - Lessons from the Book of Habakkuk

Honesty with God: Habakkuk openly asks, "How long, Lord, must I call for help, but you do not listen?" ([Hab. 1:2](#)), modelling that it is acceptable to bring confusion and doubt to God.

Joy in Suffering: Even when circumstances are dire (e.g., no fruit on the vines), the prophet decides to rejoice in the Lord, finding strength in God as his salvation.



3 - Lessons from the Book of Habakkuk

The Sanctuary Context: Similar to the understanding of the sanctuary, Habakkuk emphasizes that "the LORD is in his holy temple" ([Hab. 2:20](#)), which implies that he is presiding over the final judgment.

The End-Time Message: The book speaks to a people living in a time of great wickedness, urging them to wait for the final vindication of righteousness, similar to the Advent hope of the Second Coming.




Conclusion

God is Sovereign: God is in control, even when He uses difficult circumstances or nations to accomplish His purposes, and He has not abdicated the throne. The book of Habakkuk teaches that the righteous live by faith, trusting in God's sovereignty and justice even when facing injustice, suffering, and unanswered prayers. It encourages honest communication with God, patient waiting, and finding joy in Him rather than in circumstances, as He holds ultimate control.


