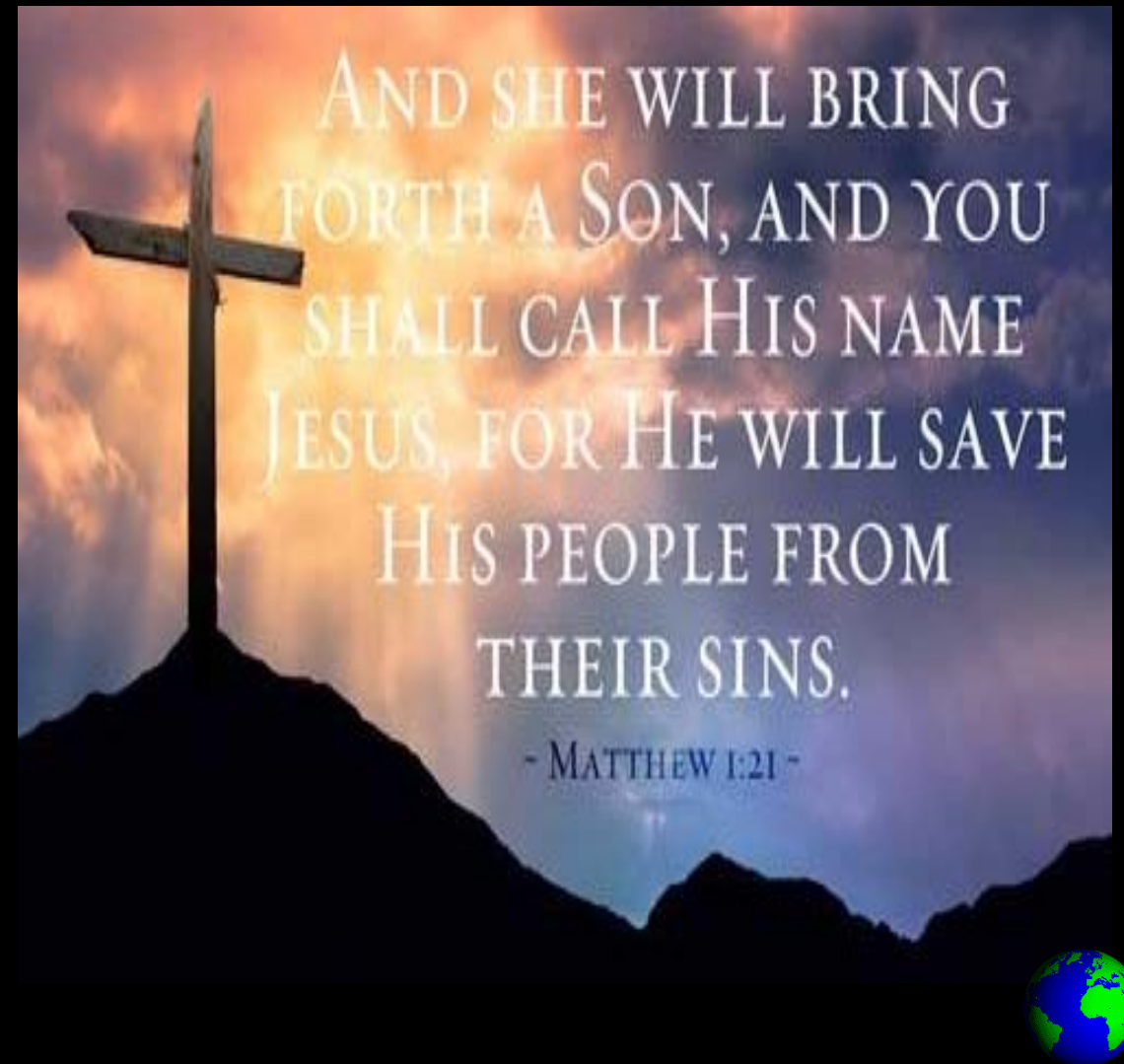


Introduction

1. The Message of Salvation for All

Grace for the Unlikely: The inclusion of Tamar, Rahab, Ruth, and Bathsheba in the genealogy ([Matthew 1](#)) is highlighted as proof that Jesus came to save sinners and that salvation extends to Gentiles, not just the Jewish nation.

The Gentle King: In contrast to worldly kings, Jesus is presented as a king who serves and redeems, ultimately bringing "all nations" into his kingdom.

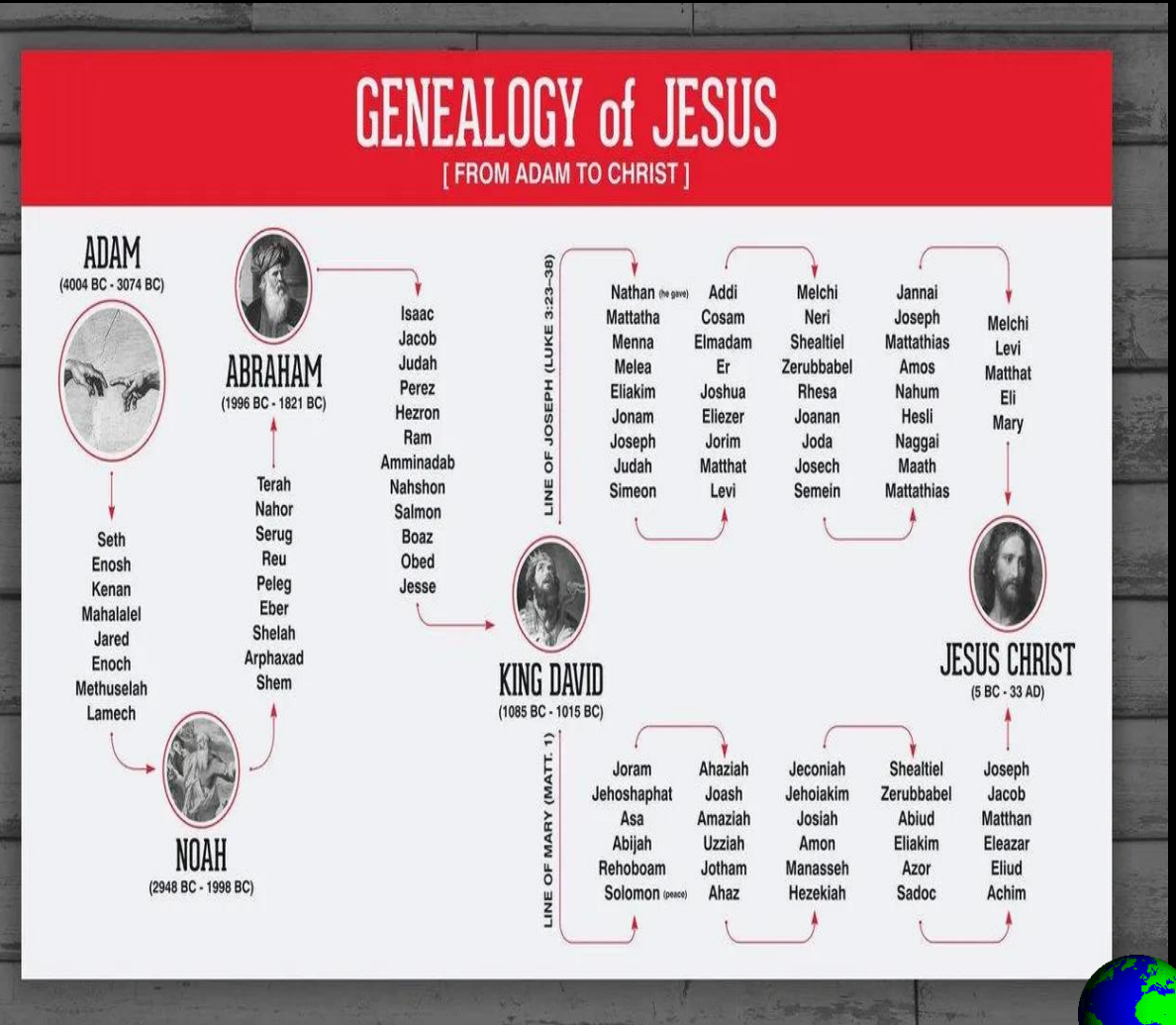
2. Jesus as the Fulfillment of Prophecy (The Messiah)

Genealogy and Birth (Ch. 1-2):

Matthew begins by establishing Jesus as the legal descendant of Abraham and King David, confirming Him as the rightful King. Jesus is "Emmanuel" (God with us), fulfilling Isaiah's prophecy and bridging the gap between God and humanity.

The Ministry of Preparation (Ch. 3-4):

John the Baptist prepares the way, followed by Jesus' baptism and wilderness temptations. Jesus is shown as victorious over temptation, qualifying Him as the Savior from sin.



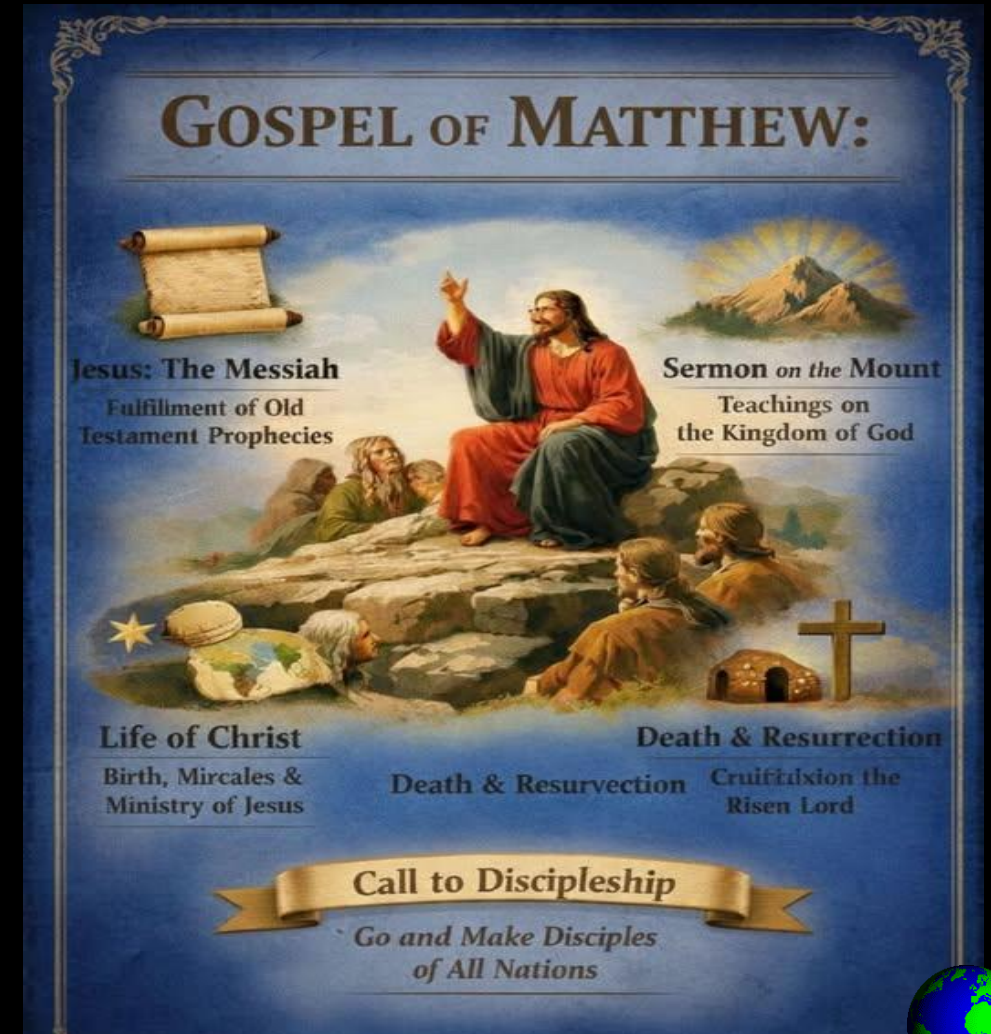

3. The Kingdom of Heaven and New Teacher

The Sermon on the Mount (Ch. 5-7): This is the divine standard of character, Jesus calling for an inner righteousness rather than just outward compliance.

The Authority of Jesus (Ch. 8-10): Jesus demonstrates authority over disease, demons, nature, and sin itself, establishing His Kingdom through healing and ministry rather than political force.

Parables of the Kingdom (Ch. 13): Jesus explains the nature of the Kingdom of Heaven, often emphasizing its quiet, inward growth and final, dramatic judgment, a key area of study for understanding the end times.

4. God With Us (Immanuel) and Rejection

Conflict with Leaders (Ch. 11-12):

Despite His miracles, Jesus faces growing rejection from the religious establishment. This highlights the theme of the "remnant" and the contrast between true spiritual obedience and legalistic tradition.

Divine Humanity (Ch. 14): The feeding of the 5,000 and walking on water demonstrate Jesus' power over material limitations, reinforcing that He is the Creator present in human form.

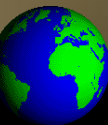


3 - *Lessons in the book of Matthew*

Jesus is "God With Us": From the promise of Immanuel to the promise of "I am with you always" ([Matthew 28:20](#)), the lesson concludes that Jesus is intimately present with His people in their struggles, questions, and daily lives.

The "Upside-Down" Kingdom:

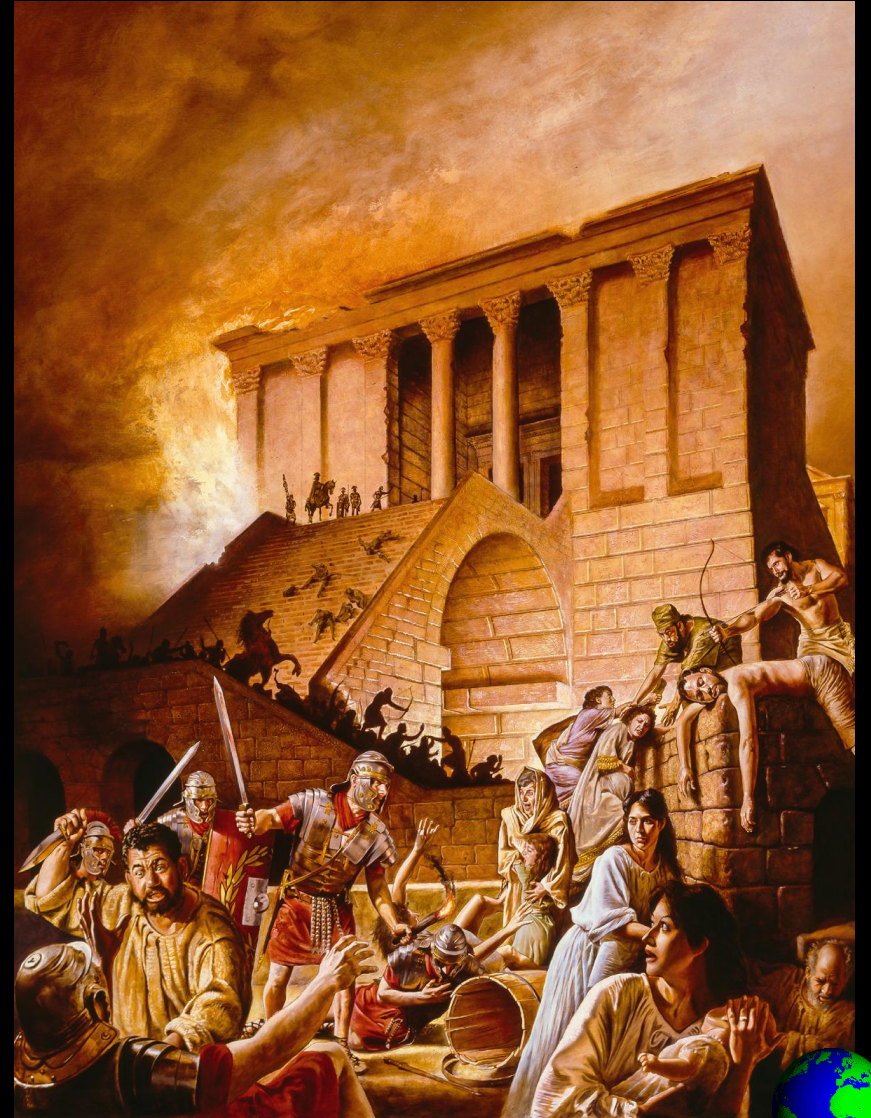
Matthew's Gospel calls believers to reject worldly values of power and status, replacing them with a kingdom defined by humble service, mercy, and love—exemplified by Jesus.



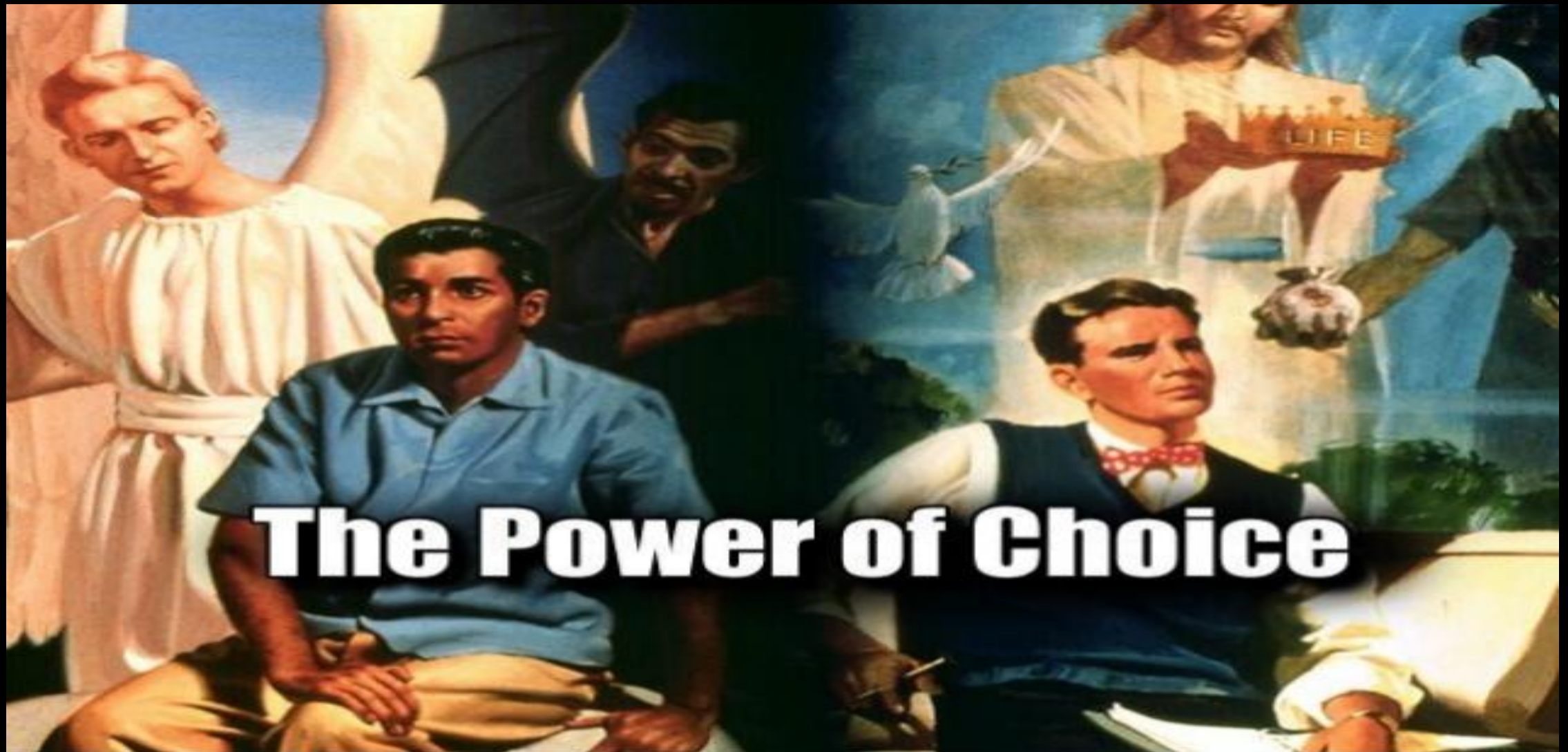
Conclusion

Salvation by Grace through Faith: The lesson emphasizes that righteousness is not achieved by works, but is a gift received through a right relationship with Jesus. Like the genealogy, which includes sinners, we are all in need of grace, and salvation is for those who rely totally on Him.

Urgency of Preparation: The conclusion often highlights the necessity of constant spiritual vigilance (watching) and faithfulness in one's calling, as sudden events (symbolized by the destruction of Jerusalem) anticipate the final events of the Second Coming.

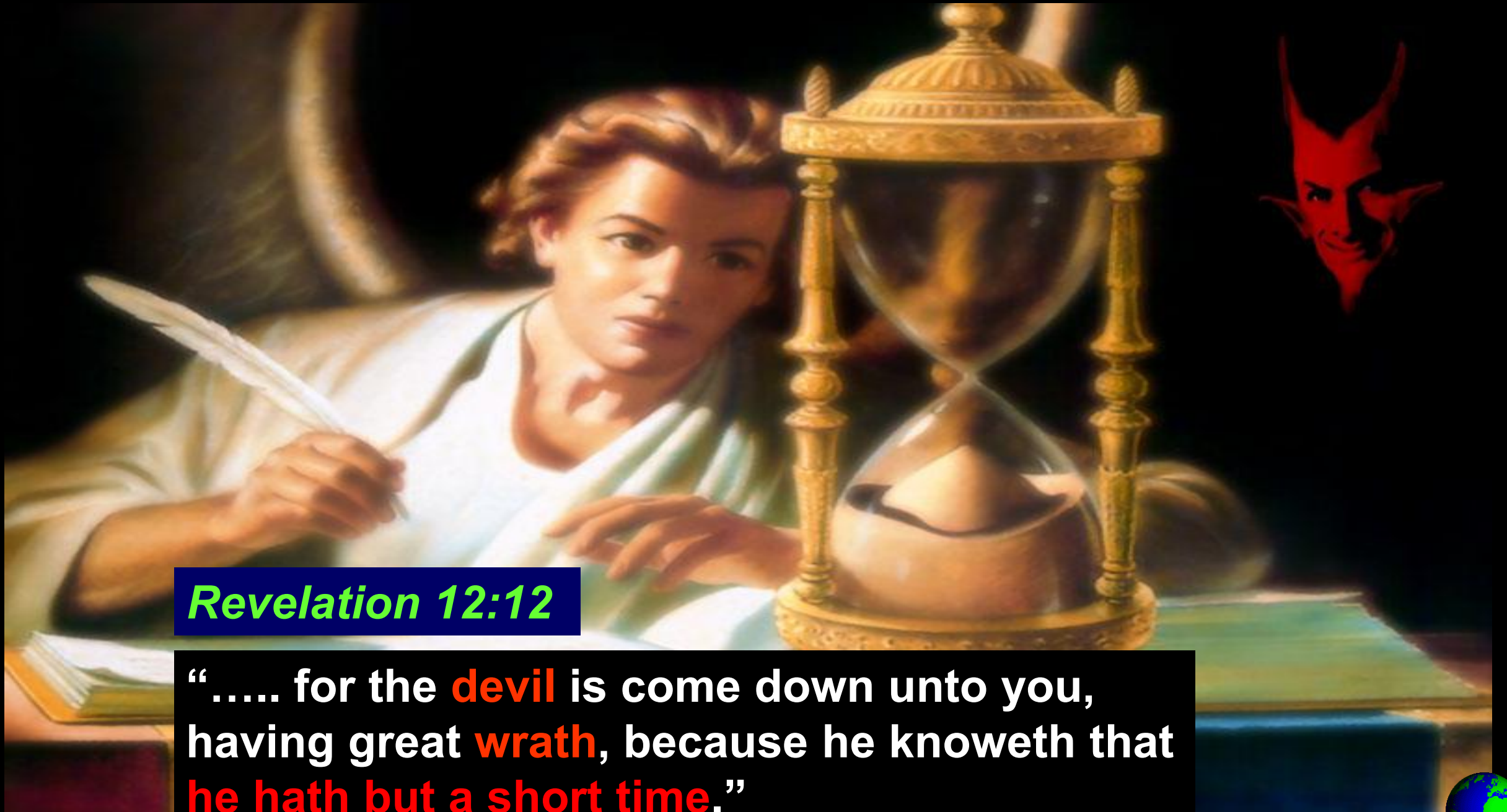

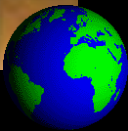

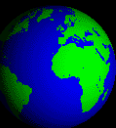
