Health Snippet – Black sapote

Side effects: *eating unripe fruit causes mouth & throat irritation, nausea, and digestive upset*

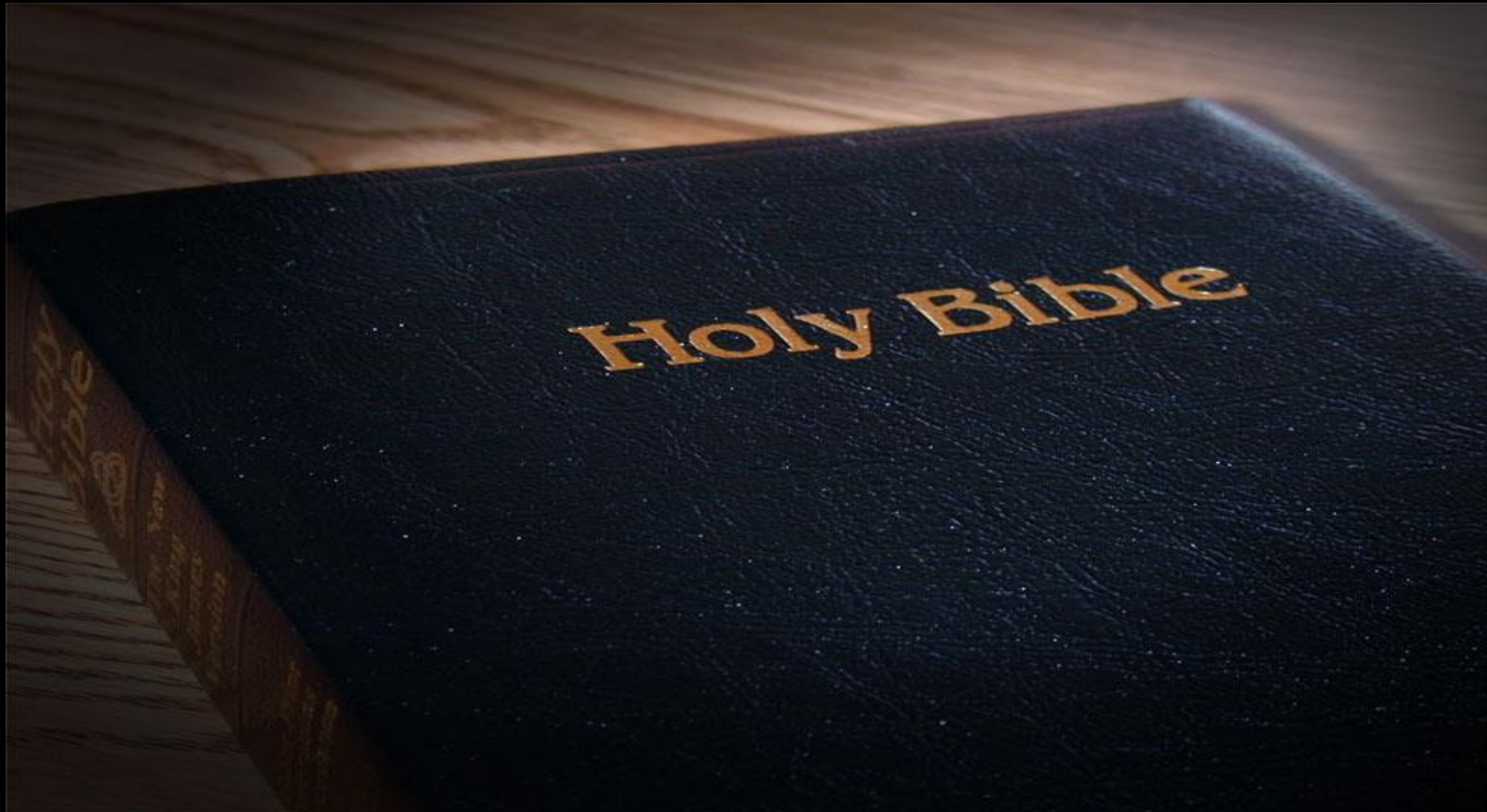

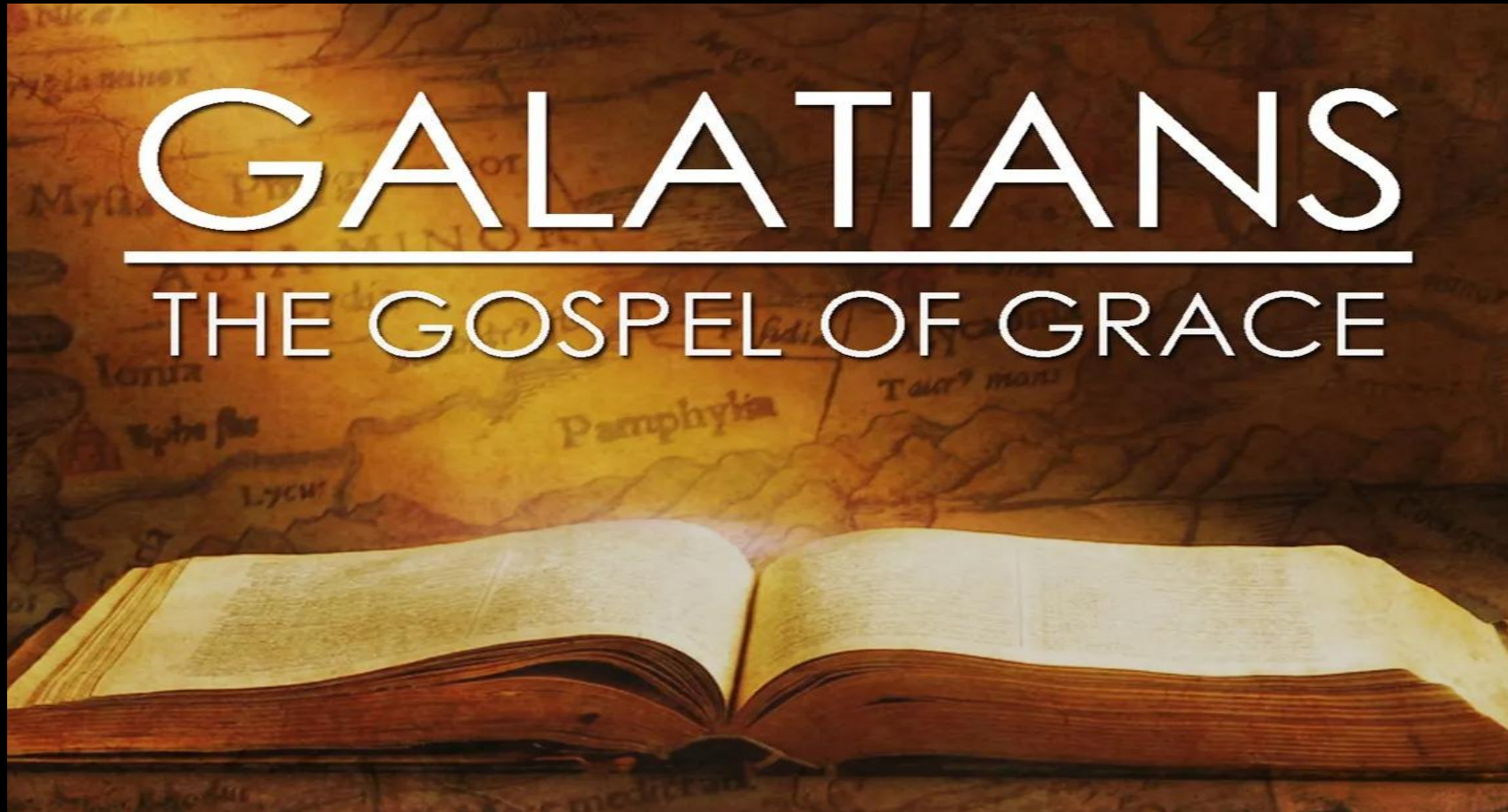

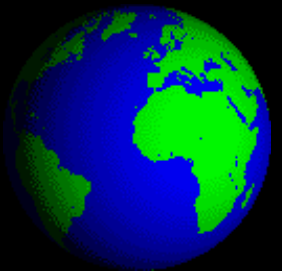

Introduction

Chapter 1: The Divine Origin of the True Gospel

Theme: Paul defends his apostolic authority and the heavenly source of his message.

Key Details: Paul declares he received his commission directly from Jesus Christ, not man. He expresses shock that the Galatians are turning to a "different gospel" and pronounces a spiritual warning against perverting Christ's grace.

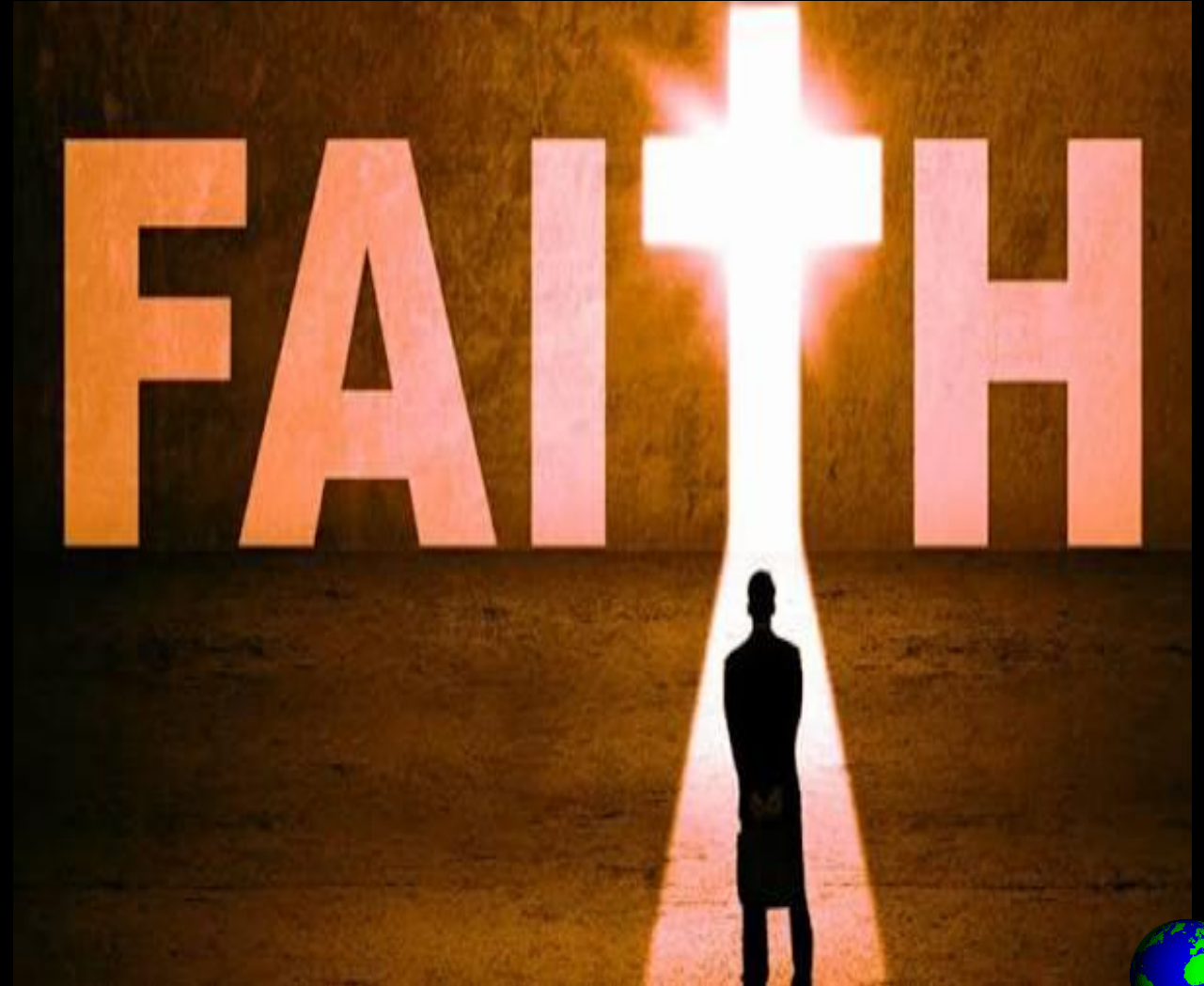


Introduction

Chapter 2: Justification by Faith Alone

Theme: Equality in the gospel and freedom from legalistic rituals.

Key Details: Paul recounts confronting Peter at Antioch when Peter yielded to peer pressure from legalists. Paul states famously that a person is justified by the faith of Christ and not by the works of the law, concluding, "I am crucified with Christ: nevertheless, I live; yet not I, but Christ liveth in me" ([Galatians 2:20](#)).

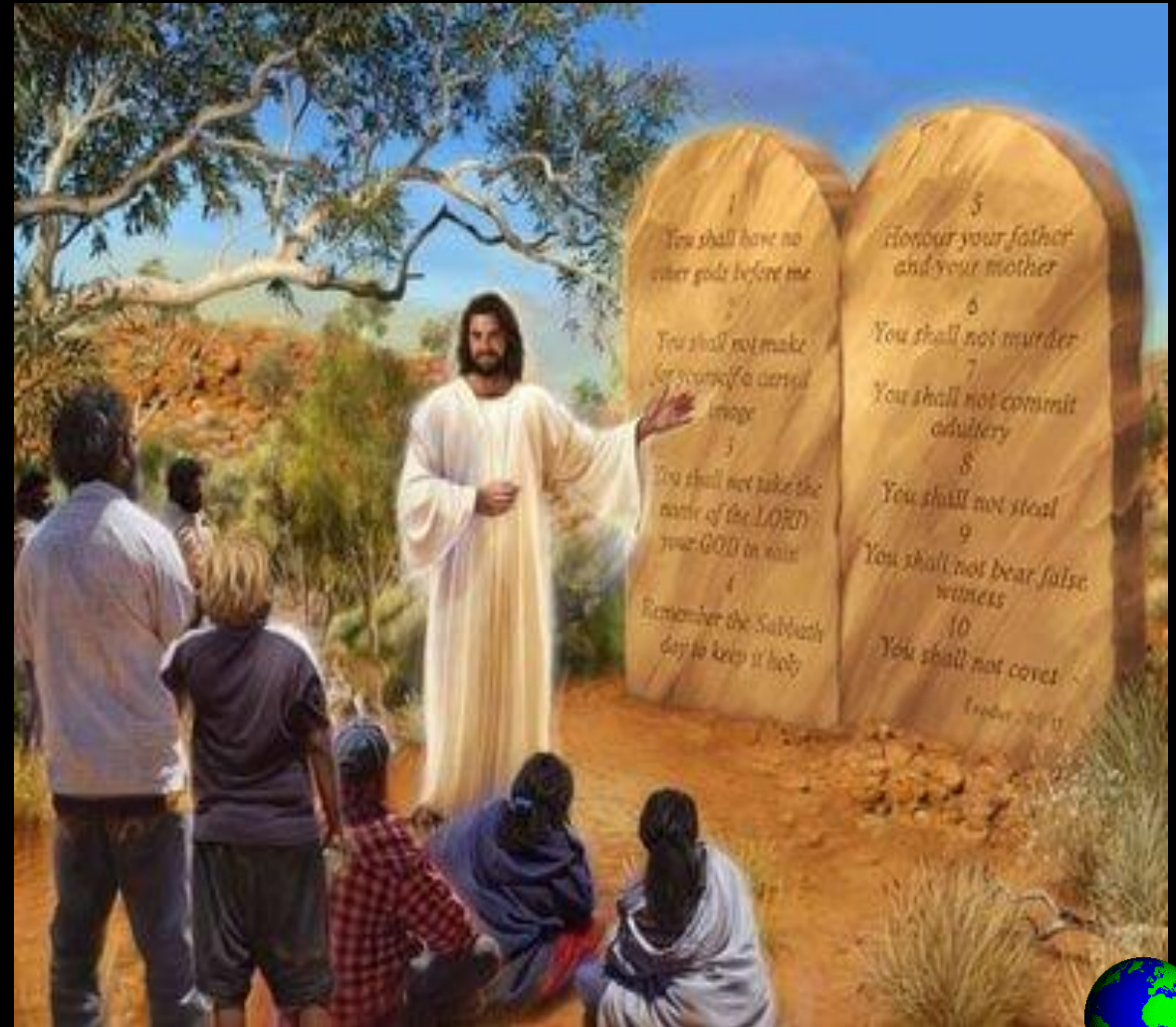


Introduction

Chapter 3: Abraham's Promise vs. Law as a Schoolmaster

Theme: Faith predates the Mosaic covenant and points forward to Christ.

Key Details: Paul uses Abraham as the primary example of a person justified by belief, not rituals. He explains that the temporary ceremonial law acted as a "schoolmaster" to lead people to Christ, because true spiritual inheritance comes through the promise made to Christ.

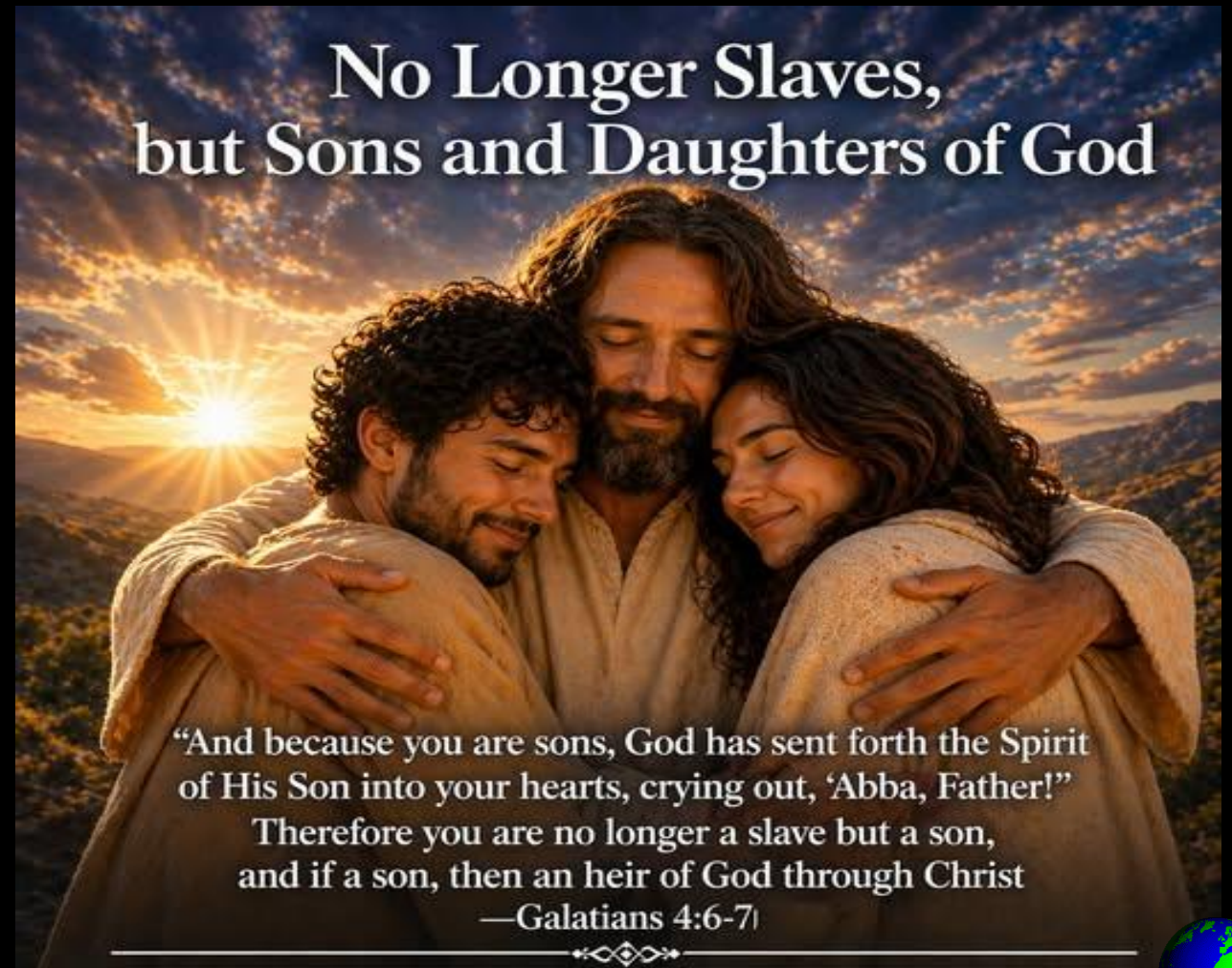


Introduction

Chapter 4: Sons and Daughters, Not Slaves

Theme: Spiritual adoption and the danger of sliding back into spiritual bondage.

Key Details: Through Christ, believers move from the status of legal servants to adopted children ("Abba, Father"). Paul uses an allegory of Hagar and Sarah to contrast legal bondage (earthly Jerusalem) with spiritual freedom (the heavenly Jerusalem).



Introduction

Chapter 5: Christian Liberty and the Fruit of the Spirit

Theme: Standing fast in freedom while avoiding license or legalism.

Key Details: Circumcision has no power in Christ; what matters is "faith which worketh by love" ([Galatians 5:6](#)). Paul contrasts the destructive works of the flesh with the transformational, character-building fruit of the Spirit (love, joy, peace, etc.).

Introduction

Chapter 6: Bear One Another's Burdens and New Creation

Theme: Practical Christian community living and the cross as our only glory.

Key Details: Believers should restore those caught in faults with meekness and bear one another's burdens. Paul warns that what a person sows, they will also reap. He closes by glorying only in the cross of Christ and bearing the "marks of the Lord Jesus".

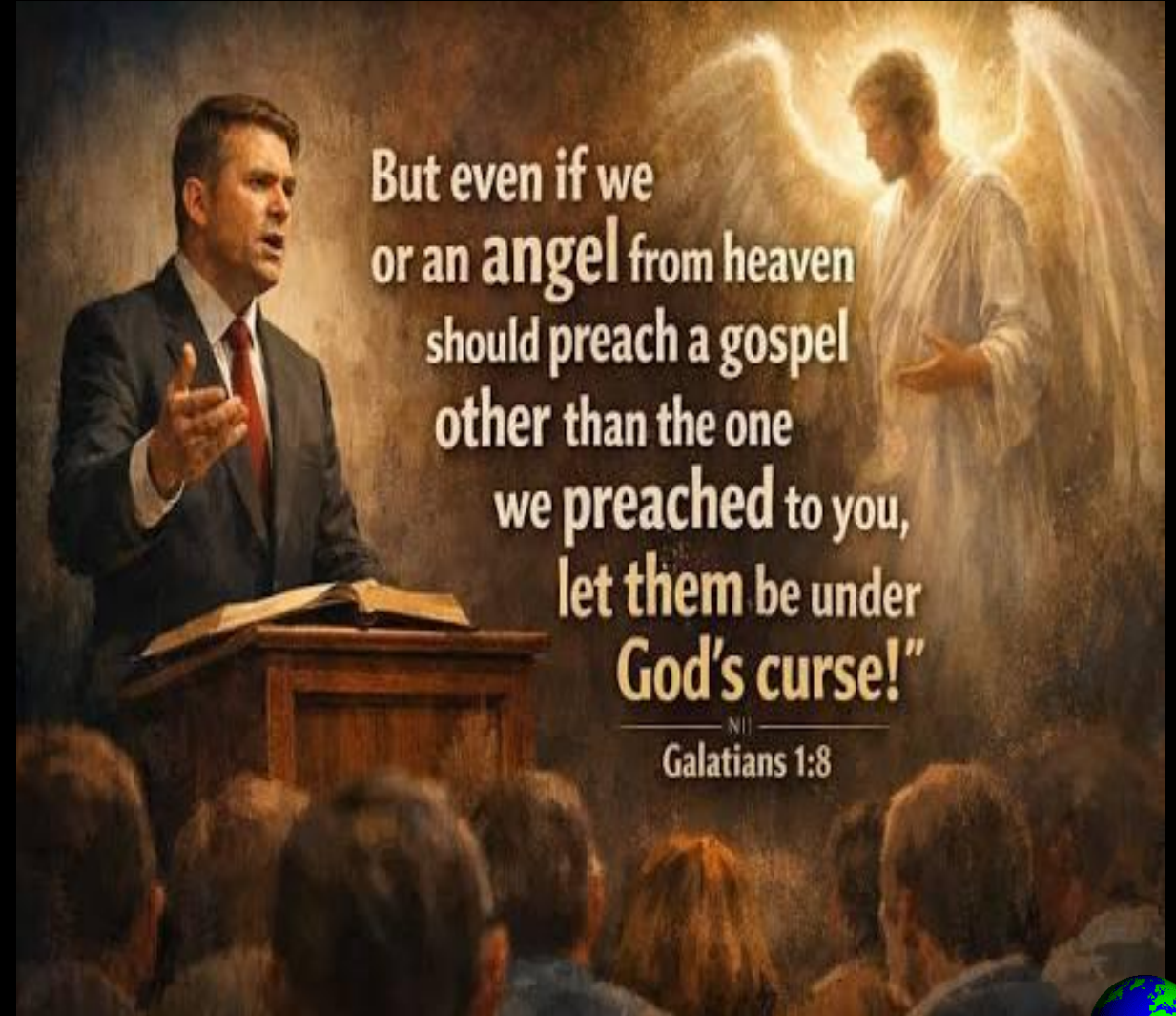

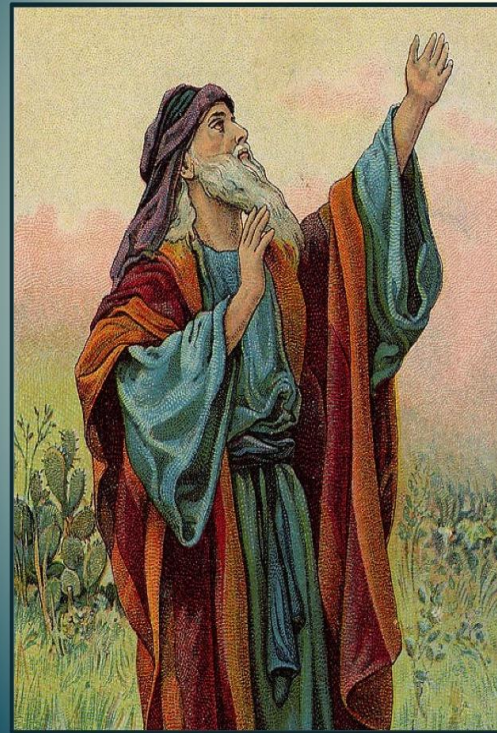

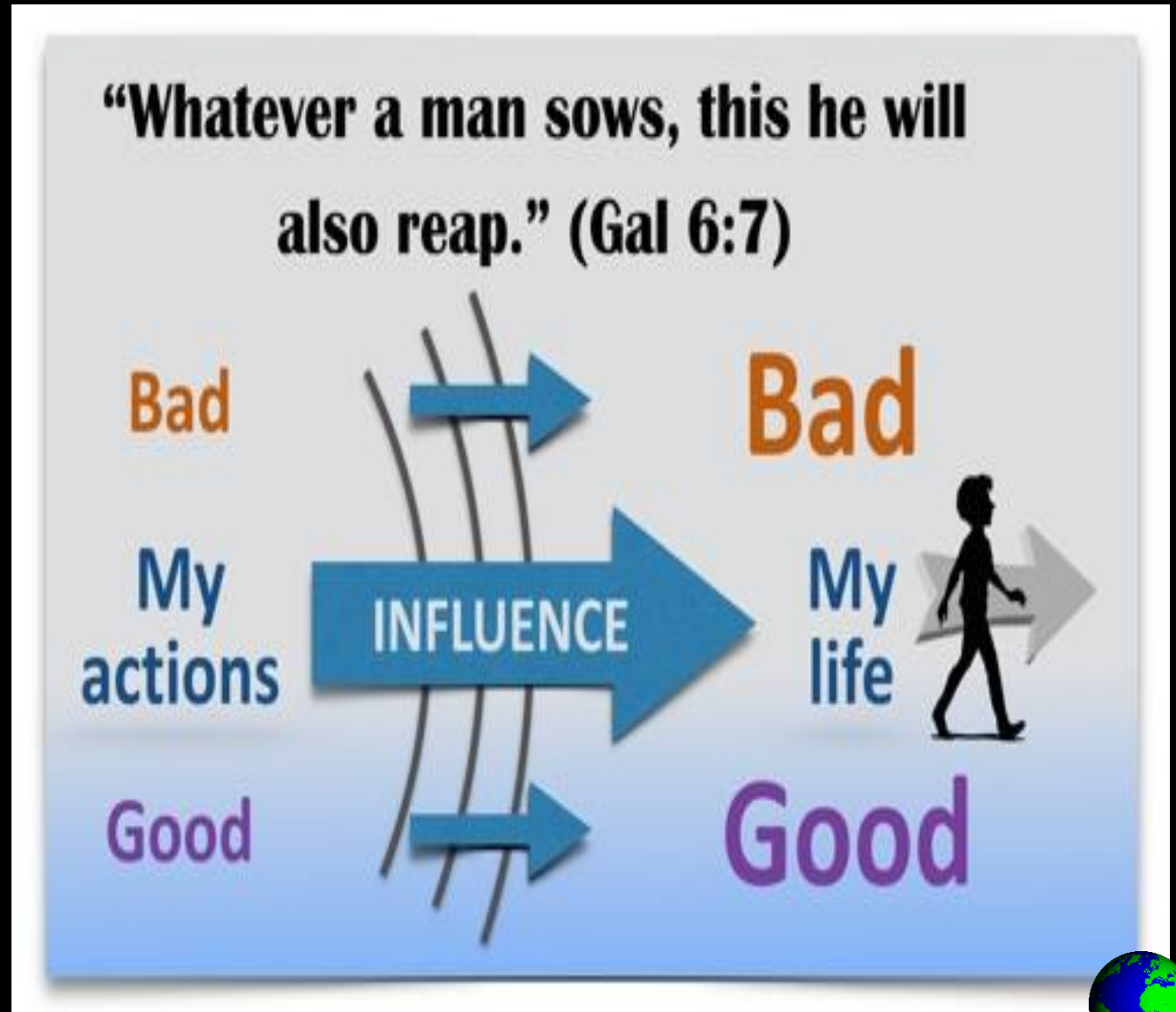

3 - Lessons in the book of Galatians

Chapter 1: The Only True Gospel

Apostolic Authority: Paul defends his calling, stating it came directly from God, not man.

No Other Gospel: He rebukes the Galatians for turning to a different, distorted message.

Lesson: Salvation cannot be earned through human systems or changing truths; Christ's historic sacrifice is completely sufficient.



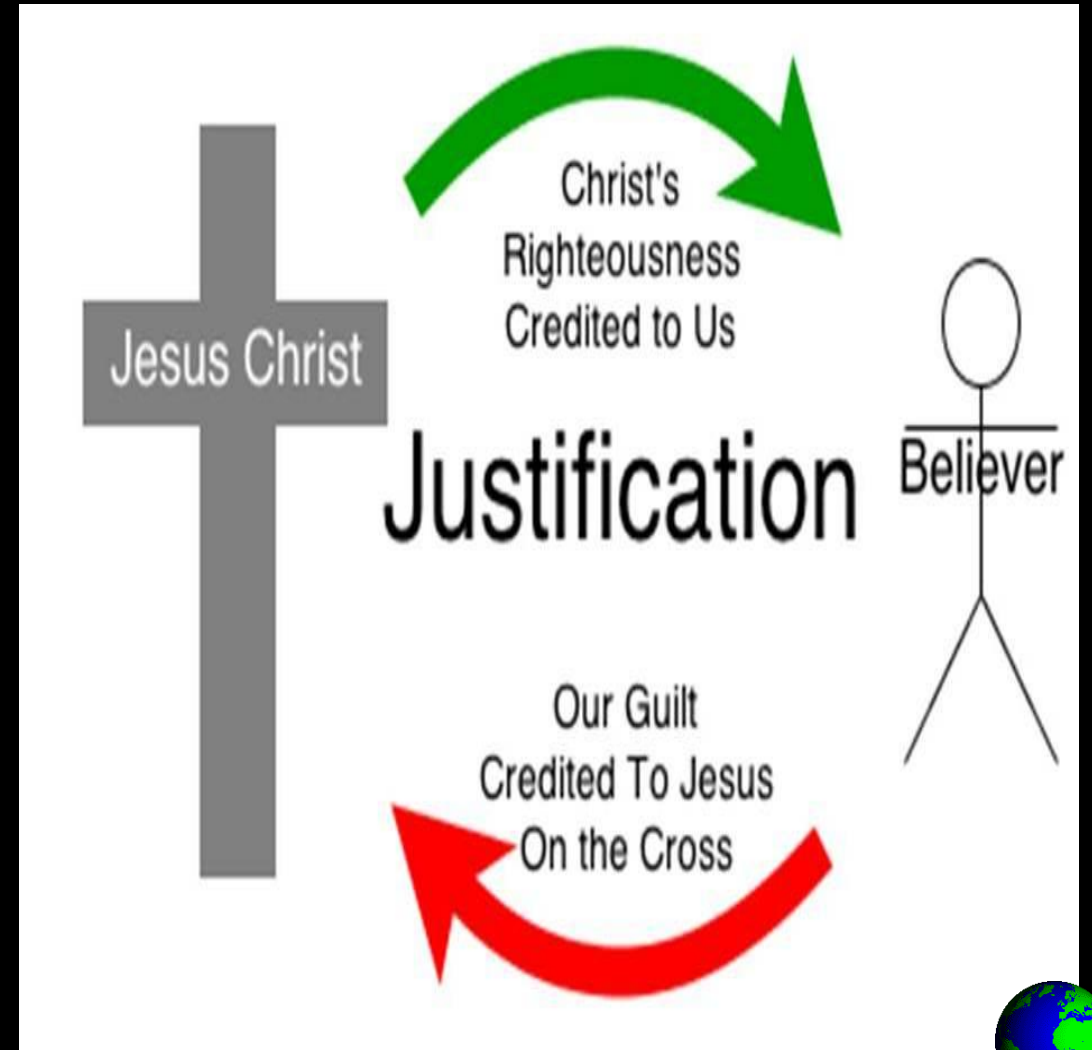
3 - Lessons in the book of Galatians

Chapter 2: Justified by Faith, Not Rituals

The Council at Jerusalem: Paul recounts opposing legal pressure to compel Gentile circumcision.

Dying to Self: Famous declaration that a person is justified by faith in Christ, not by the works of the ceremonial law ([Galatians 2:16](#)).

Lesson: Rituals cannot save us. True Christian experience is Christ living His obedient, loving life inside the believer.



3 - Lessons in the book of Galatians

Chapter 3: The Promise to Abraham and the Schoolmaster

Faith vs. Works: Paul asks how they received the Spirit—by hearing with faith or doing works?

The Law as a Schoolmaster

(Tutor): [Galatians 3:24](#) explains that the law points us to Christ for justification.

Lesson: The moral law reveals sin and our need of a Savior, but it cannot wash away guilt. Grace redeems us from the curse of transgression.



3 - Lessons in the book of Galatians

Chapter 4: Sons and Daughters, Not Slaves

Adoption: Believers move from spiritual childhood and bondage under temporary systems into full adoption as God's children.

Hagar and Sarah: An allegory contrasting legal slavery with the freedom of the heavenly promise.

Lesson: Returning to legalistic rule-keeping to earn God's favor puts a free person back into spiritual chains.

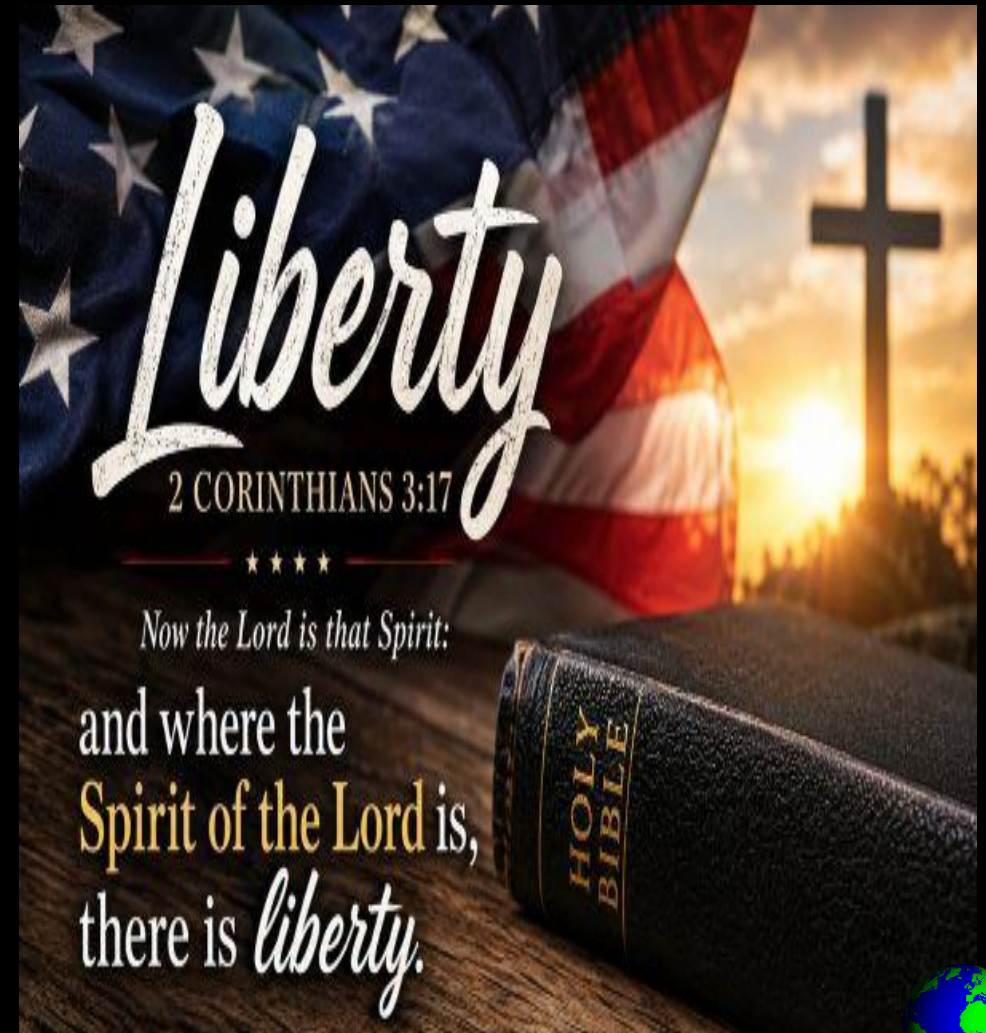

Chapter 5: Christian Liberty and the Spirit

Stand Fast: Warning not to be entangled again with the yoke of bondage, specifically ritual circumcision.

Fruit of the Spirit: Contrast between the works of the flesh and the inward production of love, joy, and peace ([Galatians 5:22–23](#)).

Lesson: The moral law of God is fulfilled through love energized by the Holy Spirit, not forced compliance.



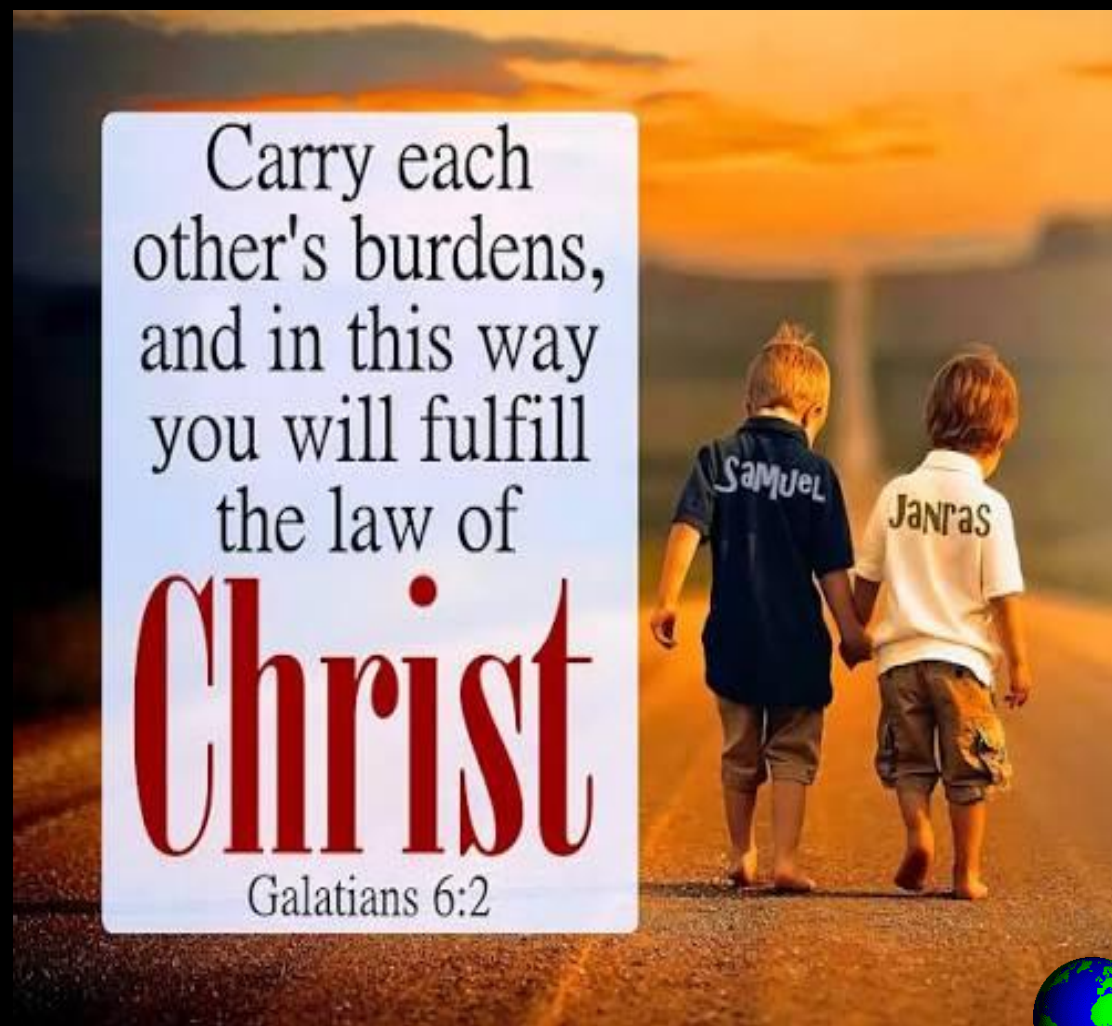
Conclusion

Chapter 6: Bearing Burdens and the New Creation

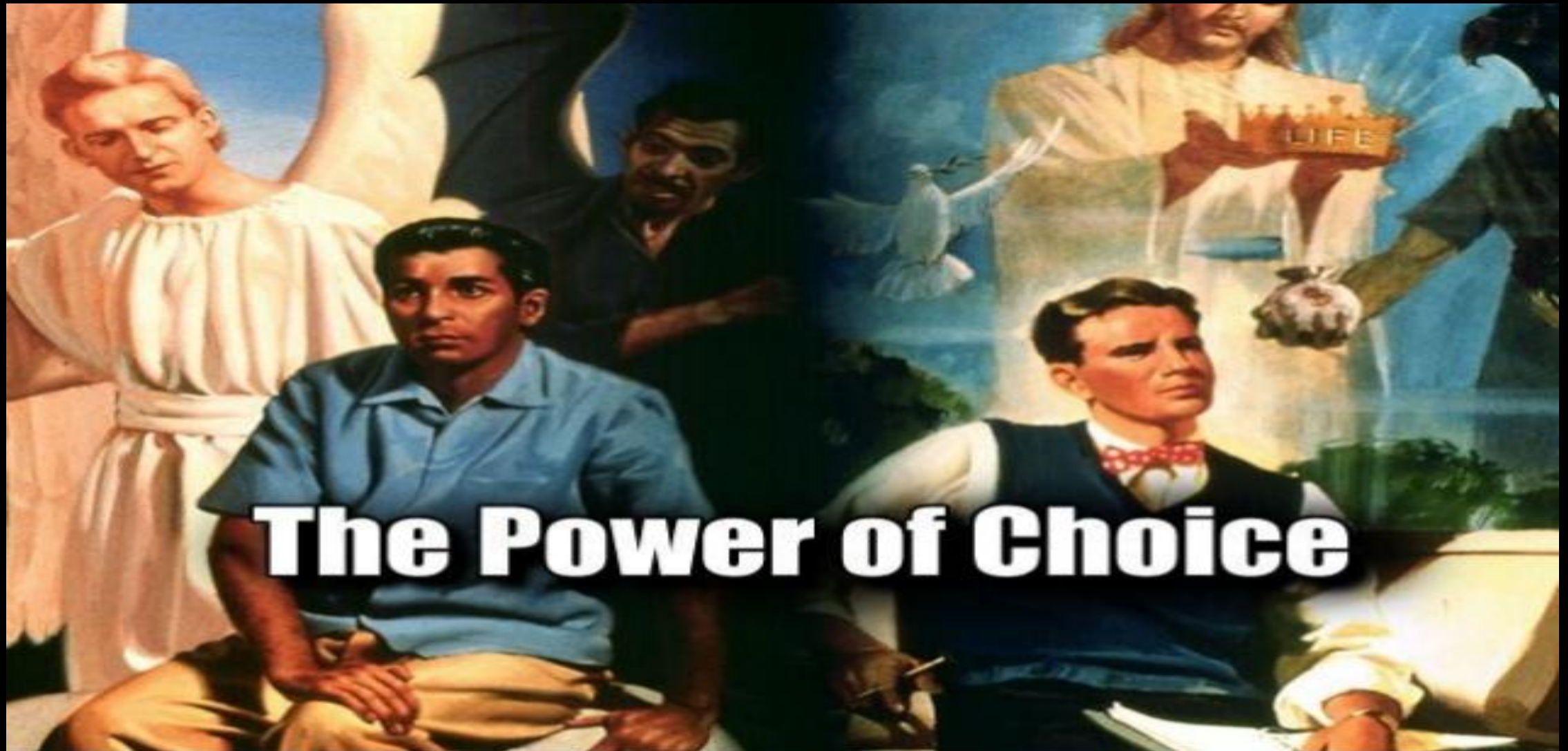
Restoring Others: Instructions to gently lift up those caught in a fault while watching our own hearts.

Sowing and Reaping: Whatever a person plants in their daily life, they will harvest.

Lesson: Outward badges mean nothing; what counts is a "new creation" transformed by God's grace and active in practical kindness.

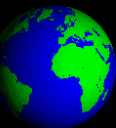
